

Welcome to ReFrame and our sixth year of bringing Peterborough a mid-winter extravaganza ——three-days of outstanding films that celebrate life and human dignity around the globe and here at home.

Our annual search for movies gives all of us—the ReFrame collective and audiences alike—a chance to discover committed and creative artists who use their cameras to capture the experiences of remarkable ordinary people who make extraordinary changes in their own lives and often in the lives of their communities. The amazing power of these moving images—just a strip of celluloid or a digital picture— re-frames how we understand the world and encourages us to reflect on global and personal relationships. Just watching movies, and talking about them, can revitalize us and reignite our desire to take action.

From underground journalists in Burma to an exposé of pharmaceutical companies that manufacture women's illnesses—we hope the 2010 films will inspire your everyday actions or encourage you to work for a more socially and environmentally just world.

ReFrame is, first and foremost, a film festival that celebrates the latest cinematic works on social justice from our community, Canada, and around the world. Many local and regional filmmakers attend the screenings, and special panels help us develop our knowledge and appreciation for the complex decisions and creative processes of media-makers. We especially hope you will join us at the filmmakers' panel on Saturday, January 30, 5:30 pm at Showplace.

But ReFrame is also a co-operative bonanza. You, the audience, form the heart of the event, while over 70 volunteers of all ages bring the festival to life. Over 100 community organizations and businesses sponsor the three-day festival. Representatives of local groups introduce programs, making links between what is happening in the films and what is happening in our own city, and inviting us to get involved on a local level.

ReFrame does not just focus on the art of film. Community arts workshops, art exhibits, late-night shows, free trade products and displays, and international food vendors are part of the 2010 program.

Did you know that ReFrame is active all year long? Just preceding the main festival REELkids offers programs for over 3,000 elementary school students, and our high-school program focuses on smaller numbers but digs deep into understanding and practising the art of social justice filmmaking. And throughout the year we work with our community partners to bring special screenings to the area.

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

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Whose truth are you telling?

This year we are looking at the subject of truth and objectivity. When are filmmakers too close to their subject or too far? Is it possible or even desirable to be objective? Whose truth does filmmaking tell and how? How does the filmmaker deal with insider/outsider status in relation to the interviewees?

INVITED FILMMAKERS BIOGRAPHIES

LILA GHOBADY began working as AD for M. Mansouri on his film *Trial*, which won the best documentary prize at the Tribeca Film Festival in New York, 2003. Lila also produced a few secretly made documentaries, *Utopia and Epitaph*, which deal with Iranian sex-trade workers living under Islamic fundamentalist rule.

ALBERTO GUEVARA, originally from Nicaragua, is a multi-disciplinary artist. With Elysée Nouvet, in 2007 he directed and produced *Dalits, Dramas, and Dreams*. He teaches at York University.

With a background in popular education and organizing within social movements, AMY M. MILLER (Canada) is excited about having found documentary filmmaking as a way of mixing art and agitation. Currently she is involved in numerous media projects, including reporting for Free Speech Radio News, Groundwire, The Dominion, and the Independent Media Centre- Montréal. Her work has screened at festivals internationally from England to Canada at festivals such as the Exile Film Festival and the Calgary International Film Festival.

ELYSÉE NOUVET, a Toronto-based artist and doctoral candidate, has written, filmed, directed, edited, and managed a variety of visual initiatives in Canada, Nepal, and Nicaragua.

NELOFER PAZIRA is an Afghan-Canadian actor-director. Since 1996 Nelofer has made two documentary films about Iran. Pazira played the lead role in Mohsen Makhmalbaf's film *Kandahar*—a film based on Pazira's real-life story.



SARA ROQUE is a multi-talented Metis filmmaker, writer, arts administrator and activist who has been involved in a number of community-based arts and Aboriginal history projects. Her short films have screened at ImagineNative Film Festival and

the Splice This! Super8 film festival, and have been broadcast on MuchMusic. She is originally from northern Ontario and currently lives in Toronto. Six Miles Deep is her first documentary.

ALLAN TONG is a Toronto filmmaker, who made the short comedy



for Bravo, I Want To Be A Desi. His previous film, the short drama, GRANGE AVENUE (2008), played the festival circuit and was broadcast on the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. He apprenticed as a documentary director and

producer at the National Film Board of Canada. His articles about cinema have appeared in respected journals including POV, Take One and CinemaScope as well as The Globe and Mail, Exclaim! and The Festival Daily published by the Toronto International Film Festival. He has organized and programmed for festivals including Planet In Focus Environmental and CONTACT Toronto Photography.

PERFORMER BIOGRAPHIES

Trent Voices of Burma Art Exhibition

Voices of Burma is an OPIRG working group at Trent University. They raise awareness about the situation in Burma by holding events around Peterborough. 

Changing Our World



When U.S. bombs destroyed the Iraq Film Archives during the 2003 war, a journalist went into the wreckage and rescued eight scraps of celluloid totalling 14.3 seconds. In 2004 ICARP (the Iraq Coalition Archives Restoration Project) announced that it

intended to use these scraps to painstakingly reconstruct what was once considered the greatest collection of Arab Cinema in the world. Here are the first six restorations, including *Al Mas' Ala Al-Kubra* (Dir. Mohamed Shukri Jameel, 1983, an epic about the 1920s uprising against British colonial rule, starring Yousef al-Any and Oliver Reed) and *Al Ayyam Al-Tawila* (Dir. Tewfik Saleh, 1980, based on an autobiographical novel by Saddam Hussein).

John Greyson is a prolific video artist, filmmaker, and writer whose work has been screened in numerous international festivals and venues.


AfricVille Productions; Filmed and edited by Brian Mitolo; Canada 23 min 2009

Many of us assume that there are only two genders and that being female or male follows from the sex of our biological bodies. Focusing on the art, photography, and performances of six "alternative"

gender artists of Maori, Samoan-Japanese, and Pakeha descent, this film poses the questions: What if "male" and "female" are not the only options? How do other genders express themselves through art?

Kirsty MacDonald won the 2006 DOCNZ Best Emerging Filmmaker Award. Her short film *Black and White* (featuring Rebecca Swan and Mani Bruce Mitchell) has screened in over 20 international film festivals and won several "Best of Festival" awards. She graduated from the University of Auckland in 2007 with a Masters in Directing Documentary.

regain his pristine looks; but the more he tries, the worse it gets.





Burma VJ: Reporting from a Closed Country

Amidst marching monks, brutal police agents, and shooting military the Burmese video reporters embark on their dangerous mission, working around the

clock to keep the world informed of events inside the closed country. Their compulsive instinct to shoot what they witness, rather than any deliberate heroism, turns their lives into that of freedom fighters.

Anders Østergaard is an award-winning Danish director. Mixing documentary footage with staged shots has been a hallmark of his films. In 2008 *Burma VJ* was selected for the Joris Ivens Competition and Movies That Matter, IDFA, Amsterdam.



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

He is also the web producer of the Homeless Nation.org, a web project dedicated to bridging the digital divide - allowing everyone to participate in online culture.

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

She is originally from northern Ontario and currently lives in Toronto. Six Miles Deep is her first documentary.





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
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
